- Set minimum standards to ensure that a person is treated with dignity, fairness, respect and equality
- Reflect human rights, as universal <u>legal guarantees</u> belonging to all human beings, at the EU level

Fundamental rights at the borders

Frontex guarantees the protection of fundamental rights in accordance with relevant EU and international law, in particular the access to asylum and international protection and compliance with the principle of non-refoulement.

- Annual Report








Main tasks

- Assess fundamental rights compliance of operational activities
- Inform the FCO and report to FRO on possible fundamental rights violations
- Advise and assist on fundamental rights in the preparation, conduct and evaluation of Frontex operational activities
- Contribute to training activities on fundamental rights
- Promote fundamental rights in all Frontex activities as part of EIBM
- Open Act as forced-return monitors
- FROMs cooperate with all operational stakeholders
- FROMs have access to all areas and documents of the operational activities of the Agency
