

- 1033 kilometers of borders with Algeria
- 473 kilometers of borders with Libya
- 1148 kilometers of coast line

- Counter border crimes: Terrorism, smuggling, human trafficking, and irregular migration;
- Executing advanced alarm operation (reconnaissance, monitoring, ambushes);
- ensure the security and protection of the property of border residents, and vital facilities;
- Cooperating with different forces in order to secure land border;
- Contributing to the rescue operations and environmental protection;






